MALDEF JOINS FORCES WITH GOLDSTEIN, BORGEN, DARDARIAN & HO TO CHALLENGE ABC USD IN DEFENSE OF CALIFORNIA VOTING RIGHTS

School district accused of violating 2001 California Voting Rights Act

LOS ANGELES, CA – MALDEF today joined forces with Goldstein, Borgen, Dardarian & Ho to file suit against ABC Unified School District (ABC USD) for violating the California Voting Rights Act of 2001. The District uses an at-large method to elect its Board of Trustees, which has denied Latino residents the opportunity to elect Board Members of their choice for more than fifteen years. ABC USD is comprised of Artesia, Cerritos, Hawaiian Gardens, part of Lakewood, Long Beach, Norwalk, and La Mirada.

"With the growing Latino student population nationwide, it is particularly important that our democratic processes work to secure adequate opportunity for the Latino community to elect its representatives to participate in school governance," stated **Thomas A. Saenz**, President and General Counsel of MALDEF.

Twenty-three percent of the current voting-age population within ABC USD is Latino, yet there is no Latino representation on the seven-member Board of Trustees. ABC USD's at-large election process does not require candidates to reside in any particular portion or zone of the district, and any eligible voter may vote for any candidate, regardless of where that voter resides. All seven of the current Board members reside in one city, Cerritos, of the seven cities that comprise the ABC USD. MALDEF and Goldstein, Borgen, Dardarian & Ho argue that this method has led to vote dilution, and has prevented Latinos from electing candidates of their choice or influencing the outcome of Board elections.

Moreover, patterns of racially polarized voting in ABC USD elections have been detrimental to the

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mobilization of Latino voting power, and have allowed the non-Latino super-majority to overcome Latino voting strength. In the lawsuit, MALDEF and Goldstein, Borgen, Dardarian & Ho argue for the implementation of a district-based election system, which would provide all voters, regardless of race, an opportunity to elect candidates of their choice and influence election outcomes.

Laura Ho, partner at Goldstein, Borgen, Dardarian & Ho and attorney for the plaintiffs said, "ABC's at-large method of election violates the California Voting Rights Act because racially polarized voting has resulted in vote dilution for Latino voters and denied them effective political participation in elections to the Board."

Olga Rios, a plaintiff in the case, attended ABC USD schools for her entire K-12 education and has two children in the district. She applied for an open position on the Board two years ago and was interviewed. But, the district decided not to appoint anybody to the position until the next election, despite Olga's exceptional credentials in education, including a Master's Degree in education from Harvard University.

Ms. Rios said, "As much as we all like to dream that we now live in a colorblind society, it has been clear to my community for some time now that the ABC school district's at-large method of election prevents Latino voters from electing candidates of our choice."

The right to vote is fundamental to democracy in the U.S., and must be protected for all citizens, regardless of race. MALDEF and Goldstein, Borgen, Dardarian & Ho support equal board representation for all communities within ABC USD, and will protect the right to a political voice wherever it may be threatened.

COMPLAINT FOR VIOLATION OF THE CALIFORNIA VOTING RIGHTS ACT OF 2011

Plaintiffs Olga Rios, Mariana Rios, and Thomas Chavez ("Plaintiffs") complain and allege as follows:

NATURE OF THE CASE

- 1. This action is brought by Plaintiffs for declaratory and injunctive relief against the ABC Unified School District, located in Los Angeles County, California (also referred to as "ABC" or "ABC USD"), for its violation of the California Voting Rights Act of 2001 (hereinafter the "CVRA"), Cal. Elec. Code § 14025 et seq. ABC's at-large method of election of its Board of Trustees ("Board") has resulted in vote dilution for Latino/a residents and has denied them effective political participation in elections to the Board. ABC's at-large method of election for electing members to its Board of Trustees prevents Latino/a residents from electing candidates of their choice or influencing the outcome of Board elections.
- 2. The effects of ABC's at-large method of election are apparent and compelling. Despite a Latino/a population of approximately 32% in the ABC USD, and a Latino/a California voting age population of approximately 23%, there are no Latino/a members of the seven member Board of Trustees at present, and there has been none in over fifteen years. Moreover, during that period, and previously, Latino/a voters of the ABC USD lacked the ability to elect candidates of their choice to the Board. The historical and current absence of any Latinos/as on ABC's Board reveals a lack of access for Latino voters to the political process.
 - 3. ABC's at-large method of election violates the CVRA.
- 4. Plaintiffs bring this action to enjoin ABC's continued abridgment of Latino voting rights. Plaintiffs seek a declaration from this Court that the at-large method of election currently used by ABC violates the CVRA. Plaintiffs seek injunctive relief enjoining ABC from further imposing or applying its current at-large method of election. Further, Plaintiffs seek injunctive relief requiring the ABC to design and implement district-based elections or other alternative relief tailored to remedy the ABC's violation of the CVRA.

PARTIES

5. Plaintiff Olga Rios is a registered voter residing in the City of Lakewood, California, within the ABC USD, and is eligible to vote, and has voted, in the ABC USD Board elections.

Plaintiff Rios is Latina and is a member of a protected class under the CVRA. (Cal. Elec. Code § 14026).

- 6. Plaintiff Mariana Rios is a registered voter residing in the City of Hawaiian Gardens, California, within the ABC USD, and is eligible to vote, and has voted, in the ABC USD Board elections. Plaintiff Rios is Latina and is a member of a protected class under the CVRA. (Cal. Elec. Code § 14026).
- 7. Plaintiff Thomas Chavez is a registered voter residing in the City of Norwalk, California, within the ABC USD, and is eligible to vote, and has voted, in the ABC USD Board elections. Plaintiff Chavez is Latino and is a member of a protected class under the CVRA. (Cal. Elec. Code § 14026).
- 8. Defendant ABC USD is a political subdivision within the State of California, governed by an elected Board of Trustees, and is subject to the CVRA.

JURISDICTION

9. This Court has jurisdiction over Plaintiffs' claims for declaratory and injunctive relief under the CVRA. Cal. Elec. Code § 14032.

VENUE

10. Venue as to Defendant is proper in the County of Los Angeles. Defendant is situated in the County of Los Angeles, where Plaintiffs reside and where violations of the CVRA have and, unless enjoined, will continue to occur. Cal. Civil Proc. Code § 395(a).

FACTS

- 11. ABC USD is located in the southeastern part of Los Angeles County. It includes the Cities of Artesia, Cerritos, Hawaiian Gardens, and portions of Lakewood, Long Beach, and Norwalk.
- 12. The population of the ABC USD area is 105,316 according to the 2011 Census. The Hispanic/Latino population is approximately 32% of that total. The Latino citizen voting age population ("CVAP") is approximately 23% of the total CVAP.
- 13. The Latino/a population located within ABC USD is geographically concentrated and compact.

- 14. ABC includes nineteen elementary schools, five middle schools, four comprehensive high schools, a college prep 7-12 school, a continuation high school, infant/children centers, extended-day care, and adult school.
 - 15. ABC USD is governed by a seven member Board of Education.
- 16. Members of the ABC USD Board are elected pursuant to an at-large method of election. Under this method of election, all of the eligible voters of the entire ABC USD elect members to the Board. Candidates are not required to reside in any particular portion or zone of the District. In turn, any eligible voter may vote for any candidate, regardless of where the voter resides.
- 17. Board elections are held every other year, in November of odd-numbered years. The terms are staggered such that one half of the members (i.e., three or four) are elected in each odd-numbered year. The terms are normally for four years.
- 18. There are no Latino/a members of the Board of Trustees at present, and have been none since the mid-1990s. There has never been more than one Latino/a member of the Board at any time in at least the past two decades. All seven of the current Board members reside in the city of Cerritos; none of the current Board members reside in any of the other five cities that lie wholly or partly within the District.
- 19. Elections conducted within the ABC USD are characterized by racially polarized voting. Racially polarized voting occurs when members of a protected class as defined by the CVRA, Cal. Elec. Code § 14026(d), vote for candidates and electoral choices that are different from the rest of the electorate. Racially polarized voting exists within the ABC USD because there is a difference between the choices of candidates or other electoral choices that are preferred by Latino/a voters and the choices of candidates or other electoral choices that are preferred by voters in the rest of the electorate.
- 20. Racially polarized voting consists both of voter cohesion on the part of Latino/a voters and of bloc voting by the non-Latino electorate against the choices of Latino/a voters. Such polarized voting is legally significant in the ABC Board elections because it dilutes the opportunity of Latino/a voters to elect candidates of their choice.

- 21. Patterns of racially polarized voting impede opportunities for Latino voters to elect candidates of their choice to the at-large Board positions in the ABC USD, where the non-Latino majority dominates elections. Racially polarized voting patterns have regularly occurred in ABC USD elections since at least the 1990s, and can be observed in analysis of the voting for and against the Latino/a candidates for the Board during that period, thereby harming Latino/a voters. In addition, racially polarized voting has occurred in the ABC USD area in elections for statewide elective office, in which there were one or more Latino/a candidates, further demonstrating the prevalence of racially polarized voting patterns in the ABC USD electorate.
- 22. The at-large method of election and repeated racially polarized voting has caused Latino vote dilution within the ABC USD. Where Latinos and the rest of the electorate express different preferences on candidates and other electoral choices, non-Latino voters, by virtue of their overall numerical supermajority among eligible voters, defeat the preferences of Latino/a voters.
- 23. The obstacles posed by the ABC USD's at-large method of election, together with racially polarized voting, impair the ability of Latino/a voters to elect candidates of their choice or to influence the outcome of elections conducted in the ABC USD.
- 24. An alternative lawful method of election, specifically, district-based elections, would provide an opportunity for the members of the protected class as defined by the CVRA to elect candidates of their choice or to influence the outcome of the ABC USD Board elections.
- 25. On June 24, 2011, Plaintiffs' counsel sent the then-President of the Board, Maynard Law, and the then-Superintendent, Dr. Gary Smuts, a letter, informing them that, based on Plaintiffs' investigation, the ABC USD's at-large election system violated the CVRA, and demanding that the ABC change from at-large to district-based elections. A copy of that letter is attached as Exhibit A to this Complaint. Subsequently, the ABC USD responded to the demand letter. That response letter was styled as a privileged and confidential settlement from an attorney for Defendant to Plaintiffs' counsel.
- 26. However, on January 12, 2012, Dr. Smuts released an open letter addressed to the "ABC Community," in which he publicly disclosed the results of a "demographic study" in the form of an Executive Summary which purportedly "assess[ed] whether the [ABC] District's at-large election methodology has produced results inconsistent with the California Voting Rights Act, and if so

21 23 24 whether the District must change to a methodology where voters in a particular ward or area elect a candidate who resides in that particular area." The Executive Summary concluded that "changing election methodologies is not required by the CVRA."

- 27. Following the public release of the Executive Summary and ABC's rejection of Plaintiffs' counsel's demand that ABC change its election system, Plaintiffs and others in the ABC USD community continued to advocate for conversion from the at-large to a district election system. Their advocacy efforts included obtaining and submitting to the Board a number of statements by elected officials in the ABC and nearby areas, as well as community organizations and individual constituents, that the present at-large system discriminates against and dilutes minority voters' rights and fails to represent fairly all geographical and racial/ethnic portions of the community, and should be changed to a district election system.
- 28. On January 16, 2013, ABC USD responded to continued community concerns raised by Plaintiffs and others that the at-large system violated the CVRA, in the form of a letter from ABC's Superintendent, Dr. Mary Sieu, to Charles Ara, one of the principle advocates in favor of the change in the election system. In that response, ABC USD relied on the previous investigation done in response to Plaintiffs' counsel's letter and reiterated its opinion that ABC USD had not violated the CVRA and would not change its at-large election system. A copy of Dr. Sieu's letter is attached as Exhibit B to this Complaint.
- 29. Following the public rejection of Plaintiffs' and others' advocacy efforts directed at obtaining a voluntary change in the election system, Plaintiffs have determined that only litigation could bring about compliance by ABC USD. Unless enjoined from proceeding with at-large elections to the Board, Defendant will conduct its future elections under the unlawful at-large election system.

FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION (Violation of California Voting Rights Act of 2001, Cal. Elec. Code § 14025 et seq.)

- 30. Plaintiffs refer to and incorporate paragraphs 1 to 29 as thoughtfully set forth herein.
- 31. Defendant's use of an at-large system of elections for the election of its Board violates the California Voting Rights Act. Cal. Elec. Code §§ 14027-14028.

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- 32. The Court is authorized to provide appropriate remedies for Defendant's violation of the California Voting Rights Act. Cal. Elec. Code § 14029.
- 33. An actual controversy has arisen and now exists between the parties relating to the legal rights and duties of all Plaintiffs and the Defendant, for which Plaintiffs desire a declaration of rights.
- 34. Defendant's wrongful conduct has caused and, unless enjoined by this Court, will continue to cause immediate and irreparable injury to Plaintiffs. In particular, unless enjoined by this Court, Defendant will hold elections for Trustees of the Board in November 2013 using an unlawful atlarge election system.
- 35. Plaintiffs have no adequate remedy at law for the injuries they currently suffer and will otherwise continue to suffer.

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs ask this Court to:

- 1. Find and declare that the ABC USD's current at-large method of election for the Board violates the CVRA, and that adoption of an election system using single member districts is required by the CVRA;
- 2. Grant preliminary and permanent injunctive relief against ABC USD from imposing or applying its current at-large method of election;
- 3. Grant injunctive relief mandating the ABC USD to design and implement district-based elections, as defined by the CVRA (Cal. Elec. Code § 14026), and/or other alternative relief tailored to remedy ABC USD's violation of the CVRA;
- 4. Grant Plaintiffs attorneys' fees and costs of litigation pursuant to the CVRA, California Elections Code § 14030, California Code of Civil Procedure § 1021.5 and/or other applicable law; and,
 - 5. Grant Plaintiffs such further relief as the Court deems just and proper.

Re: Demand for compliance with California Voting Rights Act

Dear Mr. Law and Dr. Smuts:

We have received complaints from Latino citizens and voters of the ABC Unified School District that the use of an at-large election system for the election of candidates to the Board of Education in your jurisdiction results in minority vote dilution and prevents minority voters from electing candidates of their choice or influencing the results of elections. Upon those complaints, we have investigated demographic and electoral information for your jurisdiction with particular attention to the prohibitions of the California Voting Rights Act ("CVRA") of 2001. Based on that investigation, we believe that ABC USD's at-large election system violates the CVRA and must be changed to a district election system.

The CVRA, which is a part of the California Elections Code, states in relevant part:

§ 14027. [A]n at-large method of election may not be imposed or applied in a manner that impairs the ability of a protected class to elect candidates of its choice or its ability to influence the outcome of an election, as a result of the dilution or abridgement of the rights and privileges of members of a protected class.

Latino residents of ABC USD are of course such a "protected class," and we believe that the at-large election system does result in dilution of their voting rights. Our analysis of population data from census figures reported shows that over 30% of the population of the District is Latino. However, none of the five current members of the Board of Education is Latino. Our review of membership and election records indicates that there has been only one Latino member of the Board in the past fifteen years —and that individual was elected nearly 15 years ago, in 1997. Several other Latino candidates have run unsuccessfully for election since

then, but the number of such candidates has been limited by the perception that under the at-large election system as it operates in the District, Latinos have little or no chance of being elected. Based on our review of election returns and demographic information, we believe that the lack of success of Latinos in gaining election and of Latino voters in selecting candidates of their choice results from racially polarized voting by the ABC Unified School District electorate.

The CVRA defines racially polarized voting is "voting in which there is a difference ... in the choice of candidates or other electoral choices that are preferred by voters in a protected class, and in the choice of candidates and electoral choices that are preferred by voters in the rest of the electorate." Elections Code § 14026(e). The CVRA further specifies that racially polarized voting is determined by examining the results of elections in which "one candidate is a member of a protected class or elections involving ballot measures, or other electoral choices that affect the rights and privileges of a protected class." *Id.* § 14208(a)-(b). We have followed that method in concluding that racially polarized voting exists in the ABC USD. Demonstration of minority vote dilution due to racially polarized voting under an at-large election system is sufficient to prove a violation of the CVRA.

There cannot be any doubt that the CVRA imposes constraints on the District in its choice of election system, in light of the facts summarized above. The constitutionality of the CVRA has been upheld by the California Court of Appeal in a case brought by one of the undersigned attorneys, and both the California Supreme Court and the United States Supreme Court declined to review that decision. Sanchez v. City of Modesto, 145 Cal. App. 4th 660 (2006), review denied, 2007 Cal. LEXIS 2772 (Cal. March 21, 2007) (No. S149500), cert. denied 552 U.S. 974 (2007). A number of jurisdictions, including the Merced Union High School District, Merced City School District, Visalia Unified School District, Fresno Unified School District, and State Center Community College District, have recently abandoned at-large systems and adopted district election plans when they were required to review their election systems in light of demands similar to this one. Other jurisdictions, including the City of Modesto, Madera Unified School District, and Hanford Joint Union High School District, agreed to convert to district election systems after they were sued by Latino citizens represented by one of the undersigned or his colleagues. Still other jurisdictions, including the City of Tulare and Tulare Local Healthcare District, are moving in the direction of district elections as a result of litigation although their transition is not yet completed.

In light of the lack of Latino representation and the inability of Latino voters to select candidates of their choice and to influence the outcome of elections, in violation of the California Voting Rights Act, and in the context of racially polarized voting as occurs in ABC USD's elections, we demand that the District change from at-large to district elections.

We request your response to this demand by August 1, 2011. In the absence of a satisfactory response, we and our clients will be forced to consider seeking judicial relief in the form of an action to obtain an order changing the election system from at-large to district, together with other relief provided for in the CVRA including awards of litigation and expert witness costs, and attorneys' fees.

We would be pleased to discuss the subject of this letter with you should you believe such discussion would be productive.

Dear Mr. Ara,

This letter is in response to your letter dated December 30, 2012. We received the letter and package following our winter break on January 7. The letter and attachments were also provided to all the Board Members. We are well aware that some members of our community believe that the District's reliance on at-large elections, as opposed to elections by trustee area, are inconsistent with the California Voting Rights Act. We have carefully considered this concern and have no reason to believe that the continued reliance on at-large elections in the District is not lawful. At-large elections have assured a high quality education for all students served by the ABC Unified School District precisely because each Board member represents the entire District and no Board member has a specific constituency he or she must seek to please in order assure his or her reelection.

In order to determine whether the rights of groups protected by the California Voting Rights Act and Federal Voting Rights Act were being denied by the District's longstanding use of at-large elections, we asked our attorneys, who are widely respected in the area of election law, to assess our potential liability under the CVRA. Our attorneys in turn utilized expert demographers who are familiar with the area served by the District to assist in analyzing District election results. In the Fall of 2011, the demographers studied the District's elections back to 1981, and completed a full statistical analysis of the 2003, 2005, 2007 and 2009 trustee elections. The demographers also looked at statewide elections, as well as elections in cities that are either entirely or partly within the District, and at the Cerritos Community College District elections because its territory includes portions of the ABCUSD.

Voting in ABCUSD elections shows people making choices based on factors other than race or ethnicity. The effort to change the District's election methodology falls into the category of trying to fix things that are not broken, and causing the expenditure of public dollars for matters unrelated to providing quality education to children. Members of groups protected by the Federal and State Voting Rights Acts have run for the ABCUSD Board and have often won seats. A copy of the Executive Summary of the study is attached to this letter.

While we firmly believe our election methodology fully complies with both State and Federal law, we remain prepared to cooperate with agencies who wish to further assess our compliance with applicable laws.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

We have asked legal counsel to assess whether the District's at-large election methodology has produced results inconsistent with the California Voting Rights Act, and if so whether the District must change to a methodology where voters in a particular ward or area elect a candidate who resides in that particular area. Our conclusion is that changing election methodologies is not required by the CVRA, and, from an educational perspective, such a change would not be the right thing for our students. Trying to change the District's election methodology falls into the category of trying to fix things that are not broken, and causing the expenditure of public dollars for matters unrelated to providing quality education to children.

Throughout its history the District's Board members have been voted upon by all citizens of the District, and, therefore, must represent the interests of the entire community, and not any particular, ward, city or neighborhood. By holding our elections at-large, rather than by trustee area our District has been able to maintain the quality of the education provided to all of the children in the District, despite challenging economic times. Irrespective of how any individual or group might choose to assess the District's success, when compared to similar Districts, our Board has provided the leadership necessary to maintain this District's high ranking among all districts in the State

Voting in ABC USD elections shows people making choices based on factors other than the race or ethnicity of the candidates. The effort to change the District's election methodology would require the expenditure of public dollars for matters unrelated to providing quality education to children. In our diverse community, members of groups protected by the Federal and State Voting Rights Acts have run for the ABC USD Board and have often won seats. Our voters have done an outstanding job of selecting Board members not based on their race or ethnicity but on the qualifications and character of their candidates.

Our conclusions are not based on speculation or political considerations, they are based on hard statistical evidence as determined by expert demographers. Although the population of the District is ethnically diverse, the District's election results do not suggest that voting is polarized along ethnic or racial lines. ABC represents what our Constitution envisioned. That is, an electorate that selects representatives based on the content of the candidates character and qualifications, and not the color of the candidate's skin. Creating trustee areas that emphasize ethnicity might be considered a giant step backward. ABC should be a model of what is the ideal. The statistical evidence certainly does not indicate anything otherwise.
