# Central Basin Ethics Committee Findings Prompt GM to Ask FPPC and L.A. District Attorney to Investigate Director Bob Apodaca

Hews Media Group-Community News has obtained documents sent by Central Basin Municipal Water District GM Tony Perez to the Los Angeles District Attorney's Office and the Fair Political Practices Commission recommending that each enforcement agency commence an immediate review of allegations against embattled CBMWD Director Bob Apodaca.

The letters were prompted by the findings of the Oct. 3 CBMWD Ethics Committee meeting. Both letters were signed by Perez.

Included with the District's letters were citizen's complaints filed in late August against Apodaca.

The complaints detail three allegations involving improper conduct by Apodaca, all in reference to his girlfriend, Whittier City Commissioner Caroline Medrano.

The first complaint alleges Apodaca committed multiple Government Code Section 1090 violations by approving payments by the District to Medrano for floral arrangements totaling over \$11,000 from 2003 -2013.

states that....members of the.... district... shall not be financially interested in any contract made by them in their official capacity, or by any body or board of which they are members.

A second complaint alleges Apodaca committed insurance fraud by illegally including Medrano on his District paid

health insurance plan. Sources at the District told HMG-CN that former General Manager Art Aguilar aided Apodaca in enrolling Medrano.

> The final allegation against Apodaca involves Pacifica Services, Inc. paying Medrano as an employee and/or vendor. Pacifica won a contract in 2007 that was extended eight times on a no-bid basis with Apodaca voting for the initial contract and all eight subsequent no bid extensions.

Pacifica is currently being sued by CBMWD alleging breach contract, fraud and deceit after having billed an estimated \$5 million since 2007.

The filing of these complaints with the District Attorney and the FPPC came after a fierce effort by Board President James Roybal to protect his lone voting ally on

# **Bell Vice Mayor Accuses City Manager of Manipulating Financial Records**

Just months after the conviction of former Bell officials, payments to the city's law firm are numbering in the millions of dollars.

BELL, CA -Three years after the

discovery that Bell City Manager Robert Rizzo and others had funneled huge amounts of the city's funds into their pockets, Bell Vice-Mayor Ana Maria Quintana is accusing the City Manager and City Attorney of manipulating the city's books in order to hide exorbitant legal fees.

Quintana told Hews Media Group-Community News in a lengthy sit down Bell Vice-Mayor Ana Maria interview that she claims to have recently discovered

the existence of a "secret fund that was created by the current City Manager and City Attorney that serves to hide the huge legal fees."

During her investigation, Quintana, a graduate of Yale and Columbia Law School and a practicing real estate transaction attorney, made several public records requests that she said were never released by the city.

Quintana indicated that her persistence finally got her the records, but in the inter-

im she was removed from all committees to represent the municipality at several outside agencies. She said that city council members are also threatening to remove her as a Member of the City of Bell (Redevelopment) Successor Agency.

Quintana said that she was "dismayed" and "shocked" after she had a chance to look over internal city documents, including emails and past staff reports, where she claims to have seen "manipulation of the

city's books and hiding of fees."



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# **Death of Bellflower Man** Turns into 'Nightmare' for **Family Dealing With Mortuary**

For Evelyn Hileman of Bellflower, the recent passing of her beloved father Mi-

chael Henry Gregory-even at the age of 80-was a "sudden shock" to her and her family.

"My dad was the rock of our family, a real loving kind man who would help anyone at any time in need. He was a kind soul," Hileman said in a recent interview with Hews Media Group - Community News. Gregory passed away on September 13 after a short bout with cancer. "He was full of life and literally within a couple of months had taken ill and passed away," Hileman said.

Gregory had purchased a "Pre-Planned Funeral Package" through Luyben Family-Dilday-Mottel Mortuary who has offices

located in the city of Long Beach.

Hileman's grief was short lived and said the day of her father's funeral turned into a literal nightmare.

After arriving at the memorial service on September 20th before 11 a.m., Hileman said that a funeral director had told her that "the cemetery says you have an unpaid bill and we need \$1,250 before we can conduct the burial.""I tell her no problem and I go sit down in the front row," Hileman said.

With the service now underway, Hileman said the employee walked over to her while the pastor was conducting the service and handed her a bright yellow note that read: "Per: Forest Lawn. Fees need to be paid before service."

Hileman said she was "stunned" by the note. "I had paid them more than \$10,000 the day before, and I was not told about a remaining outstanding balance of \$1,250," she said.

Hileman said that she informed the employee that the credit card was at home. "The employee literally stood there in front of me until I told her that I will go home and get the credit card." Hileman then said her husband left the service and went home to retrieve the credit card. "It was surreal, stunning, everything was like in slow motion," she said.

Hellman said after her husband returned with the credit card in his possession, funeral staff members would not process the card because the name of the card was in Gregory's name, even though she contends that she was a co-signer on the account.

"The day before, they gladly accepted the card and our money, and charged me \$10,000 but the next day they didn't accept the same card," she said.

"They said they don't take credit cards from the deceased, and I tried to explain that I am on his bank account and that I am to Executor of his Estate," Hileman said.


While all of this was taking place, Hileman said that the Pastor had concluded his graveside service and a Military Honor Guard had unfolded the American flag and had refolded it, and that 20 white doves had been released and the service was over.


"We are walking out to our cars and here comes my husband. He tells me they want me to go home and get a check and come back and pay them or they are going to take my dad's body back to the mortuary and bury him at a later time," Hileman told HMG-CN.

"Can you believe this?" Hileman said.

"So not only was I hurting from my dad's death but now I am hurting for my husband for having missed the funeral completely," Hileman said.

HMG-CN contacted Luyben Mortuary for a comment on the situation and said in a written statement: "as a matter of policy do not discuss these matters outside of the contents of the family involved in the situation," McDunn said.



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# Lakewood Regional Medical Center Offers Robotic Surgery Program

The da Vinci Si e HD robotic surgery system was installed in the hospital's recently expanded surgical services unit earlier this year. The first procedure using the system was performed at Lakewood Regional Medical Center in August, and more cases are scheduled.

"We are very excited to offer this as a treatment option at LRMC," said Cyndee Woelfle, Associate Administrator of Lakewood Regional Medical Center. "With extremely precise movements and 10-times magnification, surgeons on our medical staff can operate with exceptional precision and clearer visibility. For many patients, that can mean a faster, less-painful recovery."

The robotic surgery program is being launched as a part of Lakewood Regional Medical Center's surgical services and will be used for specified gynecologic, urologic and general surgical procedures, such as hysterectomies or Prostatectomies, for patients who might benefit most from robotic surgery.

Doctor Jennifer Liu, Urologist at Lakewood Regional Medical Center, performed the first surgery at the hospital. She was trained to use the da Vinci Sur-

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gical system in residency and performed over one hundred cases.

"We're being very deliberate with ensuring that the members of our medical staff who use the system are very well trained at robotic surgery said Woelfle."

Along with tiny, highly-dexterous implements, the da Vinci Si e HD system at Lakewood Regional Medical Center provides a higher level of visibility for surgeons, who can view a magnified, high-resolution three dimensional image of the surgical site from the da Vinci console.

"The ability to perform surgery by looking through a laparoscope has been available for some time, and has been what enables providers to offer minimally invasive surgeries," said Woelfle. "At Lakewood, all of our operating rooms are outfitted to accommodate minimally invasive surgery, which accounts for about 90 percent of the procedures we perform. This system offers advanced 3-D high definition visualization, improved dexterity and an immersive view of the operative field."

Lakewood Regional Medical Center is offering minimally invasive robotic surgery only for those who would best be served by the service. In some cases, use of robotic surgery has not been shown to offer a significant improvement over more conventional minimally invasive approaches in terms of patient outcomes. However, in many cases, the improved imaging and movement of the extremely precise surgical implements available with minimally invasive robotic surgery can lead to positive benefits for patients.

"We built a new Interventional suite and vastly expanded our cardiac services, unit, and still, a lot of people told me that they came to see the robot," said Woelfle. "For a lot of people, this is the future of surgery, and now it's available right in their community."

the CBMWD Board. Roybal issued two memorandums canceling both Ethics Committee meetings, disregarding the legal opinion of CBMWD's own General Counsel who ruled that Roybal did not have the authority to cancel the meetings.

In a highly controversial move, Roybal then removed Director's Phil Hawkins and Art Chacon from their Ethics Committee positions. Roybal had appointed both of them earlier this year. Roybal subsequently appointed Apodaca and himself to the committee even though Roybal and Apodaca have investigations pending against them.

A determination by the District Attorney against Roybal was referred to the Grand Jury for possible indictment earlier

In response, Director's Chacon and Hawkins both called for Roybal to be removed as President claiming that "his temper tantrums and erratic behavior are acts of a dictator rather that a Board President."

The District's Administrative Code calls for committee changes and removals by the President to come before the Board at a regularly scheduled meeting.

At this time, officials at the District could not confirm that the President intends to follow through with his threats at their October 28th meeting. According to Ethics Committee Chair and former State Assemblyman Hawkins, "I would like to see two responsible Board Members join me in removing Roybal as President at the next meeting. Central Basin has been thoroughly embarrassed by this President's actions and antics and it must stop soon."

Quintana claims that once she threatened to go public with the evidence, she said that Bell administrators hastily called for financial "town hall" meeting which is to be held at 6:00p.m. at the Bell Community Center, located at 6250 Bell Ave. At least one Southern California news radio program reported on the meeting early Tuesday morning in a broadcast.

"Each month, the City Attorney sends bills to the City of Bell requesting payment for a specific amount (agreed the parties to be in the range of approximately \$100,000/month), then secretly defers payment of a much higher amount, which is credited to a hidden funding account called 'Client-No-Pays'," said Quintana.

Quintana's own calculations to date based upon the 2012-13 City of Bell's financials show the City Council approving warrants totaling \$2,173,755.90. Quintana claims the actual figure is \$3,224,940.28.

"The problem is that neither the City Council nor the community had been informed of the extra \$1,051,184.38 in expenses accrued since September/October 2012. There was no approval sought from the City Council to create this fund nor a written contract to prove its existence," said Vice-Mayor Quintana. She added, "It is now over \$1 million dollars, why wasn't this made public and why is this still continuing?"

Several efforts by Quintana to place the item on the council agenda have been re-buffed.

"In response to my questioning, the City Attorney has provided instructions on how to censure me to the City Council resulting in my removal from my committee assignments, and now they are trying to strip me of the Vice-Mayor title."

"In light of the history of Bell, it is questionable whether the deferred billing arrangement reached between the City Manager and City Attorney meets the standard of transparency the residents of the City of Bell deserve," she asserts.

Quintana laments that "despite efforts to improve government transparency in the wake of the scandal, Bell's residents are, once again, unaware of how their hard-earned taxpayer monies are being spent."

# CITY MANAGER RESPONDS TO **QUINTANA**

Bell City Manager Doug Wilmore blasted Quintana in a phone interview with Hews Media Group-Community Newspaper on Tuesday over her allega-

"There is no secret slush fund, period, and there is no attempt to hide anything from the public or the media regarding our finances," he stressed.

"The city attorney has done an amazing job and deserves a massive amount of credit in helping turn the City of Bell around. Without Dave Alshire and his firm, Bell would have declared bankrupt months ago," Wilmore said.

Wilmore said that city council members are slated to give Alshire a sevenfigure pay check within the next thirty days.

"We will be paying Dave Alshire and his firm \$1 million for the work he has done and his payment was directed and authorized by the city council," Wilmore said.

"The liabilities have been tremendous. Because of Dave's work we have gotten back \$7 million in legal fees and also avoided \$15 million in payouts in potential liability lawsuits," he sternly

Wilmore also admitted that the con-

tract with Alshire does not have a "cap amount" when it comes to how much taxpayers could eventually pay the firm.

"The city council has directed him to do the work. Nothing has been done in secret. Over this next couple of months people are going to talk about the Bell Miracle and how we made a comeback, together," Wilmore said.

The petitions allege that Baca del Rio, Altamirano and Leon "raised our taxes in the last election," "voted to give city employee Jason Stinnett, a raise as payback for running (their) reelection campaign(s)." The recall papers also claim that the three "refuse" to disclose all the names and amounts of money all the names and amounts of money given to their past campaign, as required by City and State laws.

"Why won't (they) reveal to the residents of Commerce the names of amounts of cash (they) received for their campaigns," the petitions state.

The recall petitions also claim that Leon, Altamirano and Baca del Rio "cannot be trusted to be fair and independent or to protect the interests of Commerce residents." It also alleges that the three are "political crony's" of "special interests," and will do "whatever they want," and that they are "out to take care of (themselves) and (their) corrupt friends who see Commerce as a city with a lot of money!"

"We do not need another puppet controlled by special interests," the petitions

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### ROBLES RECALL ALLEGATIONS

Perhaps more stinging are the allegations listed against first term councilmember Robles in her recall intention papers. Robles said she was served after Tuesday's city council meeting at Commerce City Hall.

"Robles has put our children in danger by allowing a convicted sex offender to live with her family in Commerce," the petition states. It also alleges that "although she is a councilmember, she believes that it is none of our business if she allows sex offenders to live in our city."

It also alleges that she "took a City car without permission to school. She knew it was illegal but did it because she did not

want to pay for gas."

The petition goes on to claim that "Robles voted NO to helping fund the City's Crush Volleyball program, which helps our girls get scholarships and go to college. When other Councilmembers voted YES, she got mad and began to stalk and threaten them."

It also states that "Robles and her corrupt friends are trying to take over Commerce. Robles is a political crony of special interests who want to take the City's money. She will do anything for them."

Robles denounced the allegations on Wednesday.

"My desire is to serve the best interest of the entire community of Commerce.

The voters did not elect me to go along with the rest of the city council, day after day, and to be a rubber stamp for campaign contributors who have given huge contracts," Robles said in an interview.

She did confirm that she is a cousin, three times removed, who is listed on the California Megan's List Registry, and that he did live at the property of her family owned property on Wellman Street in Commerce. Robles said she and her husband Richard cut ties with the family member more than 18 months ago, and that he no longer lives at the location.

"I demanded that he move from the home and he complied. This is old news," Robles said.

"This entire recall against me is nothing more than political retaliation because I am standing up against corrupt politicians here in Commerce," Robles charged.

"I might be rough around the edges sometimes, but I will not allow for my voice to be silenced as an elected official by the current city council majority," Robles said.

Robles said that she will take her case "directly to the voters, and to the good people of Commerce."

"We can spot a political smear a mile away here in Commerce. The voters here are smart and totally understands who controls who around here," Robles con-

Both teams were sloppy with their serving as they each picked up five points off of the others' serving errors and another seven in the second set.

"During practice, we are a great serving team," Murray said. "During the matches, when we are relaxed and playing together, we are an excellent serving team. Usually we have many, many aces against the other team."

Again, the teams traded point for point throughout most of the second set with Downey's largest lead being four points at 9-5. But a pair of aces from senior defensive specialist Alicia Barron tied the set at 10-10. Gahr took its first lead (12-11) moments later on an ace from senior libero Jennifer Diggs and later was serving for the set before Downey's Bela Gamboa's 16th kill tied it up at 24-24. A net violation gave Gahr another chance to win, but a serving error, a double hit violation and an ace from Gamboa ended the second set.

Gahr was trailing 21-15 in the third

set, its biggest deficit in the match, before Okaro literally brought her team back to the brink of a victory. Her 16th and final kill of the match gave Gahr possession and she served three straight aces before Downey called a timeout. It was the first time that Gahr had reeled off four straight points in the match.

Following the timeout, Okaro served two more aces to tie the set at 21-21. But Gamboa had the last of her match-high 21 kills and Victoria Trejo served two straight aces.

Gahr had entered the match coming off a pair of five-set matches to begin league action. The Gladiators fell to Warren on Oct. 3, losing in the fifth set 15-4 but came back to edge Paramount 19-17 in the fifth set on Oct. 8.

Gahr visited Lynwood on Oct. 17 and will travel to Warren on Tuesday before hosting Paramount on Thursday.

"I didn't think we were sluggish or tired," Murray said. "I think we might have other things going on mentally. I don't question our ability physically, even if we're physically tired or physically making a mistake. We have to work on our mental game.

# Norwalk jumps all over Artesia fast, remains undefeated

Everything was coming up aces for Norwalk's football team last Friday night on its homecoming game against Artesia with a Monte Carlo theme. The Lancers took advantage of two straight turnovers

within the first three minutes of the game and scored on seven straight possessions as they routed the Pioneers 62-3.

The California Interscholastic Federation-Southern Section Southeast Division's top ranked team for the sixth consecutive week improved to 6-0 overall and 2-0 in the Suburban League. In addition, Norwalk has not allowed a touchdown in 12 straight quarters and only four all season long.

"Our boys are playing pretty good football right now," said Norwalk head coach Jesse Ceniceros. "I'm just real proud of them. It's kind of hard when you have a game like this [when] you get so far up so early. You can kind of have a letdown. But they stood in there and played."

Senior wingback Rashaad
Penny put the Lancers on the board 2:35
into the game on a 60-yard touchdown

zone on Artesia's first play from scrimmage. Following the kickoff, junior free
safety Jacob Carr intercepted a pass at the
20-yard line and two plays later, he threw
a 10-yard touchdown pass to junior tight
end Dillon Faamatau for a 21-0 lead just
four minutes into the game.

After a bad snap on a punt gave the

hosts the ball at the Artesia 23-yard line, the Lancers needed four plays to add to its lead as Penny cashed in from five yards out. Artesia would get three first downs in the first half and did not get past the Norwalk 46-yard line. The Pioneers would begin their first half drives at their own five, five, 13, 23, 20, 13 and 24-yard lines.

"We can't start drives inside our five," said Artesia head coach Joe Veach. "I think we did that the first two times we had the ball. We can't turn the ball over; we did that. We didn't perform at any level of the game at all."

McDowell would add a two-yard score with 5:29 left in the third quarter and senior Dante Foster returned a kickoff 90 yards in the fourth quarter for Norwalk's final touchdown.

# **Ring of Fire Charms Cerritos**

It seemed appropriate that a show dramatizing the life of Johnny Cash would appear on the same stage at Cerritos where he once performed one of the great shows in hall history.

This week's tribute show, created by Richard Maltby was nothing like a oneman show I expected.

Instead "Ring of Fire: the Life and Music of Johnny Cash" was actually a full-scale musical with spare no expense costumes, evocative sets and an entire stage-full of actors and actresses who sang

musical vignettes that paid homage to the "Man in Black" from his early days in the cotton fields of Arkansas through stardom, addiction, bigger stardom and living legend status by the time of his rather early death at 71.

While this show was equal parts pure corn, plentiful musical show Bransonstyle drama and a genuine affection for the memory of the truly great artist it might have floundered amongst the slickness of the production except for the fact that the entire cast was made up of very talented musicians who could also act.

While the biography of Cash is applied with very broad strokes the music is lively and textured while the singing is downright outstanding from Candice Lively, Chet Wollan and Steve Lassiter who has the closet to Cash's trademark two-note bass.

Tim Drake handled the bulk of the

narration with great polish and whenever it appeared the music needed a boost the high-voltage fiddle of Amberly Rosen took over.

This is very much an ensemble effort and the music was offered in actual numbers with songs ranging from "Two Foot High and Rising" to "Daddy Sang Bass" to "the Man in Black" with the classics standing tall in "Cry Cry Cry," "Ring of Fire," "Jackson," "Folsom Prison Blues," and "I Walk the Line."

Outstanding in the medleys were the beautiful "I'll Be Waiting on the Far Side Banks of Jordan" which Johnny Cash sang with June at Cerritos and a quite literally flag waving "the Ragged Old Flag" which drew a big ovation.

# Sanchez Elementary is pilot site for disaster training

City Launches Emergency Program at NLMUSD School.

"To be a model school for this program is a major coup for Sanchez Elementary," said Norwalk-La Mirada Unified Superintendent Dr. Ruth Pérez. "SPIRIT has the potential of being a life-saving program and the District is proud to be a partner."

Vernola anticipates building relationships with first-responders to develop training for the community in areas such as first aid and CPR. If successful, the SPIR-IT program may expand to other schools and other districts, Rubio said.

"Protecting our children is of utmost importance to anyone working in the education field, so this program is essential to our development as a community and as educators," said Board President Ed Hengler.
